Happy 50th Birthday Jeakins Weir

Firm marks half a century of construction excellence with fresh new look Jeakins Weir celebrated its 50th birthday on February 12th, 2023.


50 years is a long time in the construction industry, and the company's ongoing success is testament to its continued focus on service excellence, value for money and high-quality craftsmanship.

Jeakins Weir Ltd was founded by James Weir and John Jeakins in 1973, initially to deliver housing projects for Corby Development Corporation. The company went on to build around 1,000 houses in the town. When Corby became an Enterprise Area in 1980, Jeakins Weir diversified and began to build industrial units for The Commission for New Towns.

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Built on strong foun



Jeakins Weir Ltd was founded by James Weir and John Jeakins in 1973, initially to deliver housing projects for Corby Development Corporation. Much of this then became the Earlstrees Industrial Estate which still occupies many local companies today.

Growing into new areas

Keen to proactively move the business into new areas, the company successfully applied for term contracts with the Government Property Services Agency. This saw Jeakins Weir working on new-build and refurbishment projects on military bases and airfields throughout the Midlands and

East of England. It precipitated a huge uplift in the company's workload.

Speculative developments

Anticipating future demand for more housing in the 1990's, Jeakins Weir invested in purchasing land in Rutland, Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. This opened the door to developing speculative housing projects in these areas.

The company further diversified into school building projects and other public-

sector construction and refurbishment works. At the start of the new millennium, the company began to win more contracts through local government procurement frameworks. These framework contracts remain an important source of work for the business.

Dedicated people

Today, the company is led by James Weir's sons, Alistair and Jamie. They have been with the company since the 1990's and, in the early 2000's, Alistair


Refreshed brand identity positions firm for the future.

Triple framework success

Jeakins Weir wins place on three major public-sector frameworks.

EAKINS WEIR has extended its service delivery options throughout the region by securing places on three public-sector construction frameworks – SCAPE and Pagabo. The company was appointed as a delivery partner on the frameworks following extremely rigorous tender processes.

Alistair Weir said: "Our success in being appointed to both frameworks is testament to the expertise of our brilliant team of framework and procurement managers, and our impressive track record in delivering public-sector works that add real social, economic and environmental value."

SCAPE Regional Construction framework

SCAPE is the UK's leading public sector procurement authority. Its latest four-year Regional Construction Framework will deliver up to £750m of new investment in the public sector across the Midlands and East of England. Jeakins Weir is one of eight contractors appointed to help local authorities and public sector organisations deliver ambitious, community-focused construction projects.

Jeakins Weir has been successful in all four iterations of the SCAPE regional framework to date. The company has been appointed to Lots 1 and 2, which cover projects in Derbyshire, Leicestershire, Northamptonshire, Staffordshire and Warwickshire.

John Simons, Group Procurement Director at SCAPE, said: "The next four years represent a pivotal time for public sector construction across the Midlands and East of England to deliver infrastructure that empowers local communities and generates regional economic growth... we've enhanced the framework to provide our public sector colleagues with the tools to not only deliver value-driven infrastructure in their areas but support their journey toward a net zero built environment."

Pagabo National Framework for Medium Works and Refit and Refurbishment

Jeakins Weir has been announced as a successful partner for Pagabo's National Framework for Medium Works and The Refit and Refurbishment Framework. Running until January 2027, the next-generation frameworks are one of Pagabo's most popular and active construction procurement routes for public-sector clients. As part of the partnership, Jeakins Weir will deliver newbuild works and refurbishments worth up to £1m throughout the East and West Midlands and East Anglia. This is the first time Jeakins Weir has been appointed to these frameworks, presenting an exciting opportunity to extend its delivery of public-sector building projects across a wider area, with new clients.



Triple success in housing

Work has begun on three new affordable housing schemes in the recent weeks, after Jeakins Weir was selected via open tender for projects in Nuneaton and Northampton.

WO of the schemes are being delivered for Nuneaton & Bedworth Borough Council – a brand new client for Jeakins Weir. The company will be providing a complete design-and-build service for the schemes, which have a combined value of almost £5m. They include 12 new houses at Byford Court and 14 new houses at Vale View, both in Nuneaton.

The sites are within a mile of each other, and both contracts will run concurrently. There is high demand for social housing in this area, and these new properties will provide vital homes for local people.

The third housing scheme was won with Northamptonshire Partnership Homes, a long-standing client of Jeakins Weir. Since 2018, the firm has built more than 100 homes for the organisation, which manages housing services for West Northamptonshire Council. The new contract was won via open tender, and involves constructing a 24-home development in the centre of Northampton town.

The site is in a busy residential district, close to a shopping area and dual carriageway. Jeakins Weir will apply its expertise to manage all construction sensitively on this restricted site, ensuring works are carried out with minimal disruption to local people and businesses.



Affordable ho built by local

SMEs and trainees play vital role in Hunsbury Meadows development

OCAL SME supply chain partners played a significant role in completing a major new development of affordable homes for Futures Housing Group. The designand-build project saw Jeakins Weir source two thirds of the total sub-contractor order value from within 10 miles of the site at Hunsbury Meadows in Northampton. That injected more than £2m into the immediate local economy, with 97 per cent of the project works being delivered by SMEs.

The Hunsbury Meadows development provides 34 much-needed affordable

homes in an area of high demand. The site comprises nine shared-ownership homes, 15 rent-to-buy homes and 10 affordable rent properties. The £5m contract was awarded to Jeakins Weir by Futures Housing Group, a not-for-profit organisation providing affordable homes across the East Midlands. The planning agreement included a requirement that the project incorporated a construction training programme. Jeakins Weir appointed Trainee Site Manager, Regan Aylesbury, who is studying Construction Management at Bedford College. Regan gained valuable skills and real-time

its fourth consecutive year of delivering vital defence improvement projects at the American Air Base, RAF Croughton, near Brackley in Northamptonshire. During this time the company has developed close working relationships with the Defence Infrastructure Organisation (DIO) and the United States Air Force Visiting Forces, with the help of framework partner, SCAPE.

All projects at RAF Croughton have been procured through the SCAPE Regional Construction Framework. This route to construction has been vital for the DIO, saving essential time and costs, and allowing Jeakins Weir to have a permanent base on site to administer and manage the contract independently.

Since completing its first scheme at RAF Croughton in 2019, Jeakins Weir has delivered a total of 19 projects, with a further nine at pre-construction stage, and many more in the early stages of development.

Mark Robinson, Group Chief Executive at SCAPE, said: "We are pleased to have supported our partner Jeakins Weir through the delivery of this important defence improvement scheme. In addition to accelerating the projects forward, the Regional Construction Framework has enabled significant cost and time savings for the client over a number of a years."

Delicate operations

Repairs set to restore structural health at Hinchingbrooke Hospital.



ORTH West Anglia NHS Foundation Trust has appointed Jeakins Weir to carry out essential structural repairs and roof replacement works at Hinchingbrooke Hospital in Huntingdon. Built in 1984, Hinchingbrooke Hospital is one of four hospitals in the East of England experiencing structural issues relating to the concrete panels used in some of its walls and roof. Site-wide surveys carried out by structural engineers first identified issues with these panels, known as Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RAAC). The Trust took immediate remedial action and identified all faults to ensure buildings were safe.

Now, Jeakins Weir is on site carrying out remedial works and repairs to RAAC panels in wards, corridors and offices throughout the hospital.

We are maintaining the highest safety standards while working in this live hospital environment, ensuring we take all preventative measures to safeguard patients, visitors and staff at all times." Back to school in Cambridgeshire

Jeakins Weir renews council partnership with two more school project wins

WO new school extension and refurbishment contracts are the latest awarded to Jeakins Weir in its long-standing relationship with Cambridgeshire County Council. Following the renewal of its Design-and-Build Framework with the council last year, Jeakins Weir won both contracts in a two-stage tender process.

The first is a comprehensive programme of works at Littleport Community Primary School, in Littleport near Ely. The contract, worth approximately £3.5m, will include the construction of a new seven-class extension, with cloakrooms and toilets for each classroom. The school kitchen, staff facilities and changing rooms will be refurbished and a studio space will be created using a folding wall system. The car park will also be extended to provide additional parking spaces. The whole

programme is scheduled for completion by March 2024. The second contract is with Townley Primary School in the small village of Christchurch. The close-knit school has just 86 pupils on roll, with additional younger children attending its pre-school. The building project will see Jeakins Weir constructing an extension to the main school building to create a new classroom, while repurposing an existing classroom to create a new reception and pre-school with toilet facilities and a kitchen. Outdoors, resurfacing work will take place to increase the hard play areas around the school. The new facilities will be ready for the start of the school year in September 2024.

Previously, Jeakins Weir has completed building and refurbishment works for Cambridgeshire County Council at Bellbird Primary School in Sawston, Bassingbourn Community Primary School in Royston, and Spring Common Academy in Huntingdon.



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Better kitchens and bathrooms

Two-year project improves essential facilities for Kettering and Corby tenants

VER the past two years, Jeakins
Weir has worked alongside North
Northamptonshire Council to
complete £1m-worth of much-needed
repairs and refurbishments to kitchens,
bathrooms and void properties in its social
housing. The company refurbished 70
kitchens, including 28 requiring structural
alterations, 57 bathrooms and four void
properties, as well as completing many

other small works around the Kettering and Corby boroughs.

The essential works were carried out in occupied properties, which required excellent communication between site teams, tenants, the council and the tenant liaison officer to ensure successful completion. This was made easier by Jeakins Weir having a central site office close to the properties, housing both its administrative and construction teams.

On this project, Jeakins Weir employed a full-time trainee quantity surveyor, Viraj Bipin, who was studying Quantity Surveying and Commercial Management at Oxford Brookes University. He gained essential experience in measurement, costing, contract practice, material ordering, site logistics and the M3 NHF schedule of rates.

Jeakins Weir was appointed to these works through the EEM Ltd Property Improvement Works Framework.

Council Customer Centre opens for business

Complex refurbishment and fit-out transforms two former retail units

ORTH West Leicestershire District Council's (NWLDC) new Customer Centre opened its doors on schedule after Jeakins Weir completed the refurbishment and fit-out of two former retail units. Located in the Belvoir Centre, Coalville, the modern and welcoming new 'one-stop-shop' is a place where the public can make face-to-face enquiries and use self-serve bays to access their online accounts. The new facility also houses the council's call centre and a police enquiry desk.

Jeakins Weir was awarded the £700k contract through the Scape Regional Construction framework. Following changes in staff working practices and increased hybrid working, the Council had reassessed its building needs and decided to convert two commercial shop units into a new Customer Centre. The works involved significant structural alterations to reconfigure the floor plan and create the bright, accessible public space the council wanted.

The new centre was fully fitted out with meeting rooms, a reception and waiting area, toilet facilities, staff room, a police unit and group spaces. Jeakins Weir engaged local finishing trades to transform the space into the new Customer Centre. More than two thirds of sub-contractor orders were placed within ten miles of the site. This included a local specialist to manufacture and install a curved glazed screen for the new reception desk and fit bespoke partition glazing in the public area. The technically challenging project was completed on time and on budget, ready for the council's open day.

Councillor Robert Ashman, Deputy Leader of NWLDC, said: "It's great to see our new Customer Centre open and welcoming people for face-to-face enquiries and meetings. It's a bright and modern space in the centre of town, and we hope our customers will feel the difference in comparison with our old customer service centre."
